AUTISM CONNECTIONS

Being a parent in general is not easy, but so rewarding. There are moments of doubt, struggle and triumph all wrapped in love. For one Autism Connections family, their ups and downs to find answers help led them to a present that they did not see possible six years ago.

“My husband and I welcomed Billy home at just two days old in January 2013. We were his foster parents. The first year of his life was pretty typical. We embraced him as long as we needed, not knowing when and if he would be reunified with his biological parents. However, it all changed a year later. We officially adopted Billy in 2014. Also during this time, we noticed something was not right in his development. He would never flinch when our dog barked, and I found that odd. He was not advancing as my older children did. For two years, I would talk to his doctor, but I felt my voice was not heard. This all changed when we finally went to an ENT doctor and Neurologist. Finally I felt like we were moving forward and would have answers. That is when we learned after many tests, including chromosome testing, that Billy had a microdeletion, his 17th

chromosome was missing and after more testing, this time for autism, we learned that he was on the spectrum.

I was so relieved that after two years, I was not losing my mind. I knew something was wrong and I was also so frightened of the unknown and who could help him. We knew we couldn't wait any longer for autism services as early intervention is so important. As important is also finding the right agency to work with and I am so thankful we found Judson Center!

Billy has been attending the Autism Connections program for the past two years, starting first in the Royal Oak location and now he is receiving services at their new Warren location. These past few years have been a game changer for us. Before receiving ABA (Applied Behavior Analysis) therapy, Billy did not make eye contact, could only speak a few words, and had major tantrums of aggression with kicking and screaming.

The beginning was hard for Billy to adjust too. He never wanted to leave me. I was his mom and his comfort, however, after three months that all changed. Billy was learning new skills, was talking and never wanted to leave once his session ended. At four years-old, his world opened up, it was extraordinary.

Today, Billy is a six year-old whose behaviors have really improved, he is much less aggressive. His verbal and social skills have improved. He is quite the talker! He enjoys being around people, he is so inquisitive and loves animals. If you would have asked me six years ago if this

was our life, I wouldn't believe it. However, it is so important to keep fighting for your child, keep asking your doctor questions, and if they don't listen, find a new one. That is what we did many years ago. Also, know that you are not alone and help is out there. Our family is just so thankful we found Judson Center's Autism Connections. Their staff is amazing and treat us like family. Now if you ask me about Billy and his future, I would answer without any doubt that his future is bright!” – Kristina, Billy's mom

DISABILITY SERVICES

To earn your own paycheck and be a contributing member in society may not come easy for everyone. Judson Center’s Vocational Services Program helps adults who are underemployed. We do not look at their disability, but rather the possibilities for them as we engage and collaborate with local businesses, like we have with Kelly Services and American Plastic Toys.

Dominic was referred to Judson Center from our community partner, Community Living Services. At the time of his referral, he was working part-time at a local grocery store, but he was underemployed based on his skill sets, strengths and interests. He even has an Associate’s Degree in technology.

The Judson Center’s Vocational Services team began to look for employers who were open to working with Dominic with a job coach who would be assigned to him. A job coach is instrumental to both the employee and employer as they assist in helping them enhance their independence, involvement and contribution, while also working with the employer and their coworkers in helping to develop relationships and understanding. Judson Center’s program goal is to position the adults we serve for success, providing the right job ‘fit’ and support system in place, like we did with Dominic.

“Meeting Dominic and his Employment Specialist Abe, I had a better understanding on how we could help Dominic find meaningful employment, we just needed a company that would be open to the possibility to work with all of us together and that company was


American Plastics Toys (APT),” shared Catherine, Account Talent Manager at Kelly Services.

Dominic and his job coach, John, began working with Kelly Services in Fall 2018. He was placed as a temp at American Plastics Toys, and within three months of his placement, he moved from being a temp to a full-time APT employee. “He is such a good and hardworking employee. We can always count on him to come to work, and do what he is hired to do. He likes to work and his job coach John and Employment Specialist Abe have

“I couldn’t agree more. For Kelly Services, this was the first-time we partnered with an agency assisting adults with disabilities and after working with Judson Center, Dominic and his team, I can see us continuing to do so,” shared Catherine.

For Dominic, his job as a production worker has provided him not only meaningful employment, it has also given him the opportunity to live on his own. Most recently, Dominic moved into his very own apartment.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

It is okay to ask for help and receive it, as it is never too late to live your life – just ask Kim.

Kim lived a hard and heartbreaking life which started at a very young age. She was born to parents who found comfort in their heroin use that led to Kim being born with it in her system. Then two years later her parents made some very bad choices that led to consequences where Kim was placed in foster care, placed with her aunt, her father’s sister.

Following is her story, five decades in the making in finding inner peace and help.

“My aunt was my abuser. Things were done to me that no child or adult should endure. I was treated so badly and I never understood why. And at 5 years old, I was officially adopted by my aunt and the abuse still continued. She was my monster.

As a child growing up, I would tell everyone I knew about the abuse, but no one was listening to me. I was just a child telling tales in their mind. My life took another turn when I became pregnant at age 15. I was so scared to tell my aunt that I never returned from my doctor appointment. It was also during this routine OBGYN appointment that my doctor saw evidence of abuse and he called CPS. I just could not return home for fear and I knew I had a boyfriend who loved me – so I got on the bus and ran away.

A year later and at age 16, I already had a baby, who now lived with my aunt. I was still a runaway with a new boyfriend and forced into prostitution by him. This is when I began to use heroin. My addiction helped mask the pain, suffering and the world I lived in. When I was high, I was in my happy place. It was comfort.

As time went on, I was able to adapt and manage my life by hiding my drug use. I was good at it. At 21 years-old, I had joint custody of my son, who thankfully never was abused by my abuser and I later married a great guy. A true gentleman who loved me, but I was a functioning drug addict and over time, that caught up with us. As my world crumbled again, I met other men who were not kind, had two more children and kept using and doing what I had to do to feed my addiction. I was my own worst enemy. I let abuse by others and the drug takeover.

Then one day, I decided I couldn’t live this way. I found a therapist and for almost two years, I saw her, but I never fully opened up to her and I was still that functioning addict during our meetings, so I quit therapy. It just didn’t feel right to me then.

In 2011, I found Judson Center and in 2013, I began to work closely with Andrea at Judson Center and I am so grateful for her! She changed me, she changed my life. I just wish it didn’t take as long as it did. My reality was scary, and I never stood in the mirror long enough to see what was happening to me. I felt comfortable with Andrea, she cared. She worked with me and helped me understand the trauma I endured and how I can cope and move forward. She has been my therapist for 8 years now and I am over 55 years old. I know the past doesn’t define me. It took time to get where I am right now, but I am so thankful for the help I received. Today, I love me, I am here for my family, and I am full of life. I am a functioning mom, who doesn’t let the past define my present”. Kim

#FosterLove means facing all of the ups and downs with a child with love first. It means bringing a child into your home and creating a place that is safe and nurturing, where they can thrive.

What does #fosterlove mean to you?

In Michigan right now, there are over 13,000 children in the foster care system*. Removed from the familiar places and family members they've known, these children are launched into a new normal that can be both confusing and scary. Wouldn't it be wonderful if every child entering the foster care system could be quickly placed in a safe and loving home? At Judson Center, we think so too! Unfortunately, there is a significant need for foster homes in the state of Michigan, with only 6,000 homes available for children at any given time.

Every two minutes a child enters the foster care system in the United States** and without an increase of adults who are willing to open their homes and offer unconditional love and support to a child in need, this imbalance will only continue to grow.



Introducing Patient-Centric Care

Doctor

Examines, diagnoses and treats individuals focusing on preventative, chronic or acute illnesses.

Nurse Practitioner

Examines, diagnoses and treats individuals focusing on preventative, chronic or acute illnesses.

Medical Assistant

Initial contact with patient, take vitals, history and serves as the liaison with the care team.

Certified Dietician

Focuses on nutrition that will help individuals live a healthier lifestyle.

Therapist

Helps individuals with a mental health diagnosis improve their lives.

Community Health Worker

Provides navigation and assistance in removing barriers that will help to achieve optimal health (ie, basic needs, referrals, obtaining insurance).

Psychiatrist

A physician who specializes in the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of mental illness.

Behavioral Health Specialist

Patients may define their need as a health problem, when it truly can be behavioral (ie, smoking, stress, diet). The Behavioral Health Specialist, working with the primary care team, will help the patient improve health and overall quality of life.






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
